## BANNED FENCER HITS OUT

AURENCE GOUGH, the 19-year-old U.C.D. recently expelled by the Irish Fencing Federation, feels that he has been done a grave injustice, and is angered that the Olympic Council of Izeland will not come to his aid.

After being passed over by the Federation for the team for the Olympic Games, Laurence appealed to the Olympic Council for a chance of fighting against the four selected fencers in an Olympic trial.

However, the Council has not replied although one of its mem-bers told Gough that there was nothing they could do about the tuation. Shortly after appealing the Council, Gough was ex-

When I asked Gough what was expulsion stated that such action was taken because of "conduct detrimental to the interest and character of the Pederation."

When Iasked Gought what was this conduct referred to, he replied: "All I have done is to appeal to the Council to examine my case. I have gone over the heads of the Federation. This is the only reason I can see for their action."

## Appeal useless

Gough has the right to appeal to the Federation within 10 days but, says Gough: "I have no intention of doing this as it would be utterly useless, as the majority of those persons who expelled me would be dealing with my appeal."

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the upshot of all this is that ough can never fence in Ireland gain. "I'm bitterly disappointed

as I have put a lot of time, money and effort into improving at the sport. I have gone away to numerous tournaments on the Continent at my own expense

and have devoted almost entirely the past two years to the sport.

"Furthermore, besides John Bouchier Hayes, I am the only other Irish fencer who has fulfilled the requirements laid down by the federation for Olympia consideration." Olympic consideration.

The requirements he speaks of are (A) Take part in at least three competitions abroad, ene of which may be in Britain (B) of which may be in Britain (B) Obtain a placing in a competition

Gough says, "I fulfilled both of these qualifications. Also I beat Finbar Farrell, a member of the Olympic team, twice in Epeé and once in sabre at the National Championships. In view of this I feel I at least merited a trial."

The four fencers picked to represent Ireland at Mexico are John Bouchier Hayes, Michael Finbar Farrell and Colm O'Brien. Farrell and Hayes are members of the selection committee, and also of Saile Duffy, while the other selectors are Vincent proprietor of the Fencing Academic Duffy, Duffy Fencing Academ Miss Shirley Armstrong, Salle Duffy.

Gough was a member of Salle Duffy up until two years ago when he left to join U.C.D. Last season he inspired "College" to victory over his former club in the Irish Epeé Team champion-ships. This was the first time hat U.C.D. had was accounted. U.C.D. had managed to beat Salle Duffy.
